

In an ancient Book of Institutions -  
and Memorandums of William Alwater formerly  
Bishop of Lincoln (now remaining in the  
Registry at Lincoln) who began to preside over  
that See in the year of our Lord 1514. there is  
amongst other things contained as follows. to wit

Lydington upon the  
Brand.

Henry by the grace of God King of England and  
France and Lord of Ireland To all to whom these  
present Letters shall come greeting. We have inspected our  
certain Writ of Complaint to William Heydon directed and  
upon the Files of our Chancery remaining together with a Return  
or Indorsement of our same Writ made in these Words - -  
Henry by the grace of God King of England and France and Lord  
of Ireland To William Heydon Gentleman greeting. Willing for  
certain causes, to certify upon a certain Plea held at Uppingham on  
Friday the tenth day of September in the Sixth Year of the Reign of  
the late King Henry the Seventh King of England our Father of reverend  
Memory before Sir John Ratcliff Knight late Lord Fitzwater, and Sir  
Reginald Bray Knight late Itinerant Justices of all Forests Parks  
Chases and Warrens of our aforesaid Father, about Trentham  
<sup>and had</sup> made between the same King and John late Bishop of Lincoln  
concerning certain Liberties Franchises and Acquittances which the  
aforesaid late Bishop claimed to have for himself and his successors  
in the Forest of Lyfford in the County of Rutland which Plea lately  
came to your hands after the Death of the aforesaid Reginald and  
hitherto remains in your hands as it is said. We command you that  
the aforesaid Plea with all things touching the same to us in our  
Chancery under your Seal you distinctly and openly send, and this  
Writ witness my self at Westminster the twenty third day of October  
in the fourth Year of our Reign. (Yong.) The Answer of  
William Heydon within named. The Plea of which Mention is  
within made to our Lord the King in his Chancery under my Seal  
I certify as to me is within commanded. which Plea appears in a  
certain Schedule to this Writ annexed. We have further inspected  
a certain Plea held at Uppingham on Friday the tenth day of September  
in the Sixth Year of the Reign of King Henry the Seventh before  
Sir John Ratcliffe Knight Lord Fitzwater and Sir Reginald Bray knight

Itinerant Justices of the said Lord the King of all Forests Parks-  
Chases and Warrens of the same Lord the King about Trentham and the Chief Keepers and Masters assigned to hear  
and determine all things in the premises in the aforesaid Place  
by the aforesaid William Heydon by protest of our aforesaid  
Writ to him directed, to us in our Chancery aforesaid under the  
Seal of the said William certified and returned and on the Titles of  
our aforesaid Chancery remaining and to the same Writ annex made  
in these words The Lord the King commanded John Ratcliff  
Lord Fitzwater and Sir Reginald Bray Knight by his Writ in these  
Words Henry by the Grace of God King of England and France  
and Lord of Ireland To all to whom these present Letters shall  
come greeting It appears to us by the Inspection of the Rolls of  
our Chancery that We lately caused to be made our Letters Patent in  
these words Henry by the Grace of God King of England and  
France and Lord of Ireland To all to whom these present Letters  
shall come greeting Know ye that We in consideration of the good  
and geatofue friendship which our beloved and faithful Sir John  
Ratcliff knight Lord Fitzwater Steward of our Household and Sir  
Reginald Bray Knight have bestowed and do intend to bestow  
for the future Have given and granted to the said John and  
Reginald and to either of them the Office of Guardian and Chief  
Justice of all our Forests and have constituted them and either of them  
our Itinerant Justices of all our Forests Parks Chases and warrens  
about Trentham to hear and determine all pleas of our Forests,  
and Chief Keepers and Masters Rangers of all the premises To  
have and exercise the aforesaid Office of the aforesaid John and  
Reginald and of either of them, by themselves or by their sufficient  
Deputy or sufficient Deputyes for the term of their Lives and the life  
of the longer Liver of them To take in and for the aforesaid  
Office the Fees Wages Profits Commodities and Emoluments to the  
said Office of amount due accustomed or belonging from the  
Feast of Saint Michael the Archangel last past for the Term of  
the Lives of them and either of them as aforesaid together with  
the power of making all Officers to the same Office of ancient due  
and accustomed in as ample manner and form as any person  
or persons occupying the aforesaid Office have been used, had and  
have taken in the same And we give to all and singular

Archbishops. Bishops. Abots. Priors. Dukes Earls. Barons. Knights  
Sheriffs. Foresters. Verdurers. Regarders. Woodwards and to all other  
our faithful Subjects by the Tenor of these Presents firmly in command  
that they and every of them to the aforesaid John and Reginald  
in all or any of the premises to be made and executed they aid  
assist and counsel as they ought any Statute. Act Ordination or  
Provision to the contrary made or provided notwithstanding - In  
Testimony whereof we have caused these our Letters to be made Patent  
Witness myself at Westminster the twenty fifth day of February in the  
first year of our Reign We also for that the said Letters have  
casually been lost, as before us in our aforesaid Chancery is sufficiently  
testified, and that if they should hereafter happen to find those  
Letters, they shall return them into our aforesaid Chancery there to  
be cancelled, we have caused the Tenor of the Inrollment of the  
aforesaid Letters at the Request of the aforesaid John and Reginald  
to be exemplified by these Presents. In Testimony whereof we  
have caused these our Letters to be made Patent. Witness myself  
at Westminster the fourth day of July in the third Year of our Reign  
Forest of Lyle in the County of Rutland. Pleas of the  
Forest aforesaid upon a Journey held at Leppingham on Friday  
the tenth day of September in the sixth Year of the Reign of  
King Henry the Seventh before Sir John Ratcliff Knight Lord  
Tilzwater and Sir Reginald Bray Knight Itinerant Justices of  
the said Lord the King of all Forests. Parks chaces and Warrens  
of the said Lord the King about Trentham and chief keepers and  
Masters Rangers of all the Premises to the aforesd Pleas assigned  
to hear and determine, By virtue of certain Letters patent of  
the aforesaid Justices have commanded the Sheriff of Rutland  
to issue his precept on a certain Journey before them in these words  
Sir John Ratcliff Knight Lord Tilzwater and Sir Reginald Bray  
Knight Itinerant Justices of all Forests parks chaces and  
Warrens of the Lord the King about Trentham, chief keepers and  
Masters Rangers of all the premises, to the Sheriff of Rutland.  
Greeting. On the behalf of the Lord the King we command you  
firmly injuring you that you cause to come before us our Deputy in  
this behalf at Leppingham on the tenth day of September next coming  
after the date of these presents twenty four honest and lawfule men  
of every hundred within the Forest of Lyle and lying round the  
same by whom the truth of the matter may the better be known

to enquire and do those things which to them on the behalf of the  
said Lord the King shall then and there beinjoined, And moreover  
We command You on the behalf of the said Lord the King firmly  
injoining you that without Delay You cause to come together ale  
Foresters Regarders and all other Ministers of the said Forest  
and twenty four of discreet lawfule Men of your Bailliwick by whose  
Oaths concerning the State of the said Forest We com the better and  
more fully be certifid and that you shall cause to be led those men  
by the Oaths of the said Foresters through ale the Bailliwicks of the  
said Forest on a certain Day or certain Days which you shall  
make known to them before our coming to answer or see all  
Transgressions done in the same Forest. And this you shall not omit  
for any thing and in the place of the Rangers who shall be dead  
or infirme you shall cause others to be chosen. And furthermore  
you shall cause to be proclaimed as welc in the Tyes and other  
Towns as in the Markets Fairs and other public Places within the  
aforesaid County that ale and singular Persons whosoever who have  
or claim to have Liberties Priviledges or profits within the aforesaid  
Forest that they be before us or our Deputy in this behalf at the  
aforesaid Day and Places to shew what liberties franchises  
Priviledges or profits there they have or claim to have and by what  
Warrant. And also We command You that in the said Places  
you cause to be proclaimed that ale men attacted for Vert and  
Venison in the aforesaid Forest after the last pleas of the Forest  
aforesaid held or their Pledges or Monecaptors who had Day  
for the Moneassumption aforesaid shalbe to be before the Itinerant  
Justices of the Lord the King thence next coming that at the aforesaid  
Day and Places they be before us the aforesaid Justices to stand to the  
Right and to do those things which according to the Law of the  
Forest aforesaid ought to be done. And that You be there  
with ale the Baillifs of the Hundreds aforesaid having with you  
ale the Names of ale the Men and Baillifs aforesaid together with  
this Mandato to execute and certify to us upon these and other  
Businesses touching those things. And these you are not to omit  
under the punishment thereon incumbent. Witness vs the  
aforesaid Justices at Westmynster the eighth day of July in the fifth  
Year of the Reign of the said Lord King Henry the Seventh.  
And the Sheriff to wit Thomas Sapiente Esquier made hereof

Execution &c. And upon this on the aforesaid Friday the tenth day of September in the Sixth Year of the Reign of King Henry the Seventh before the aforesaid Justices Thomas Sapeote Esquire the Sheriff aforesaid came and brought the precept to him in this behalf directed which came to him as before written. To which Precept the same Sheriff returned that he caused to come before the aforesaid Justices or their Deputy in this behalf at the Day and Place aforesaid twenty four honest and lawfule men of every hundred within the aforesaid Forest of Lisle and lying round the same by whom the Truth of the matter could the better be known to enquire and do those things which on the behalf of the Lord the King shall be then there enjoined; he also caused to come together ale ffresters, Rangers and all other Ministers of the said Forest and twenty four <sup>discreet and lawfule</sup> men of his Bailliwick by whose Oaths concerning the State of the Forest he could better and more fully certify and that he had caused to be led those men by the Oaths of the said Foresters through alle the Bailliwicks of the said Forest before the coming of the said Justices to answer or see alle the Transgressions done in the same Forest and he also caused to be proclaimed as well in the Cities and other Towns as in the Markets Fairs and other public places within the aforesaid County that alle and singular Persons who soever who have or claim to have Liberties Franchises Privileges or Profits within the aforesaid Forest that they be before the Justices aforesaid or their Deputy in this behalf at the Day and Place aforesaid to shew what Liberties Franchises Privileges or profits they have or claim to have in the aforesaid Forest and by what warrant Moreover he caused to be proclaimed in the aforesaid Places that alle men attched for Vert and Venison - in the aforesaid Forest after the last pleas of the Forest aforesaid held and their Pledges and Manneasters who had Day for the Mannestastion aforesaid to be before the Itinerant Justices of the Lord the King - then next coming that at the Day and Place aforesaid they shoud be before the Justices aforesaid to stand to the Right and to do those things which according to the Law of the Forest ought to be done. The Residue of the Execution of the aforesaid Precept appears in form following. Pleas &c. as above. John Bishop of Lincoln puts in his place William Brett his Attorney to ask challenge prosecute and defend alle Liberties Franchises

Priviledges profits Emoluments & Commodities in the aforesaid  
Forest, And for certain causes here moving the aforesaid Justices  
by Leave of the Court &c Day is given to the aforesaid Bishops at  
the City of Westminster in the County of Middlesex on the morrow of  
Saint Martin the Bishops to claim and shew his claim aforesaid &c  
At which Day before the aforesaid Justices here, to wit at Westminster  
aforesaid comes the aforesaid Bishop by his Attorney aforesaid and  
claims to have for himself and his Successors Bishops of Lincoln  
the Liberties Franchises Acquittances common of Pasture Profts and  
Emoluments underwritten in the said Forest of the said Lord the  
King of Lefeld in the said County of Rutland, to wit, To have and  
to hold his Park of Lydington as the same is now inclosed, and  
that he and his Successors may freely inclose their Parks and  
may carry their wood of Lydington when and where they will  
at their Pleasure to make give and Sele and take and cause to be  
taken without the View and ale Conhadiction of the Foresters and  
Rangers and of ale Ministers of the Lord the King and his Heirs.  
And therupon whatever they shold take or cause to be taken  
should give or Sele they might draw and remove and might cause  
to be drawn and remo<sup>ved</sup> steele and peaceably with the Liberty of  
Chiminge and without in the same Forest aforesaid being paid  
and without the View, Reclaming, Restriction contradiction or Impediment  
of the Foresters of the aforesaid Forest on any Occasion And that those  
woods and Assarts therupon made and caused to be made  
in the waste and Range and view of the Foresters  
Verders - and Rangers of the same Forest And they also  
claim that he and his Successors in <sup>his</sup> ~~the~~ Church of the Manor  
in the said County of Rutland and ale their men of Lydington -  
aforesaid or of their Demesnes be quit of Suit at the Swain mot Court  
and of Siles of the Forest aforesaid and of the Lawing of Dogs and of  
ale Summonses Pleas Plauns and Actions appertaining to the  
Foresters and Forest aforesaid - - - - -  
He also claims for himself and his Successors to ~~have~~ have  
twenty acres of Assart in Lydington aforesaid. He also  
claims to have for himself and his Successors the Deer Leaps  
in his said Park of Lydington with all Liberties to the Deer Leaps  
belonging. He also claims to have for himself and his Successors  
twenty five acres of old Assart in the Forest aforesaid quietly from

Ale Reward, and Ale Exaction, and that he and his  
Successors have an Assignment of all his Woods aforesaid wheresoever  
and whereforever they will in the proper Woods. And that they  
take in those Woods all things necessary in Green and Dry without  
the View and Delivery of the Foresters. Save the Kings Hunt or  
He also claims to have for himself and his Successors and his Men  
and Tenants at will or for years and other his Tenants of Lydington  
and Saldecote and Stokedrie Common of Pasture for ale and ale  
manner of his Beasts and ~~Cattle~~<sup>Birds</sup> as well Hogs and Geese as for  
his other Beasts and ~~Cattle~~<sup>Birds</sup> whatsoever in all times of the year -  
in a certain Place called the Brende within the Forest of Liefeld  
in the County of Rutland. And then it was demanded by Reginald  
Gayton Attorney of the said King in this behalf by what warrant  
the aforesaid now Bishop claims the Liberties Requitances Commons  
and other Premises. And the said Bishop by his attorney aforesaid  
as to all the premises except the common of Pasture aforesaid  
asks thereupon Respite to make his claim. And as to the said  
Common of Pasture in the aforesaid place called the Brende -  
the same Bishop says that he was seized of the said Manor or  
Lordship of Lydington in the County aforesaid in his Demesne as of  
Fee in right of his Church of Lincoln aforesaid and that he and  
all his Predecessors Bishops of Lincoln aforesaid were seized of the  
aforesaid Manor or Lordship in right of the Church aforesaid  
from the time whereof the memory of man is not to the contrary  
and in all that time had and used for themselves their Tenants  
or Men aforesaid of Lydington of Saldecote and Stokedrie aforesaid  
Common of Pasture for ale and all manner of their Beasts and  
~~Cattle~~<sup>Birds</sup> aforesaid in all times of the year in the aforesaid Place  
called the Brende within the Forest aforesaid as belonging to  
the said Manor or Lordship of Lydington. And this the same  
now Bishop is ready to verify as &c. and demanded that  
the common aforesaid in the aforesaid Place called the Brende  
should be allotted for him and his Successors &c. And the  
aforesaid Reginald Gayton who sues for the Lord the King in this  
Behalf says that neither the aforesaid now Bishop nor his  
Predecessors had nor were accustomed to have common in  
the aforesaid place called the Brende nor elsewhere in the -

aforsaid Forest from the time whereof there is not memory -  
as the aforsaid now Bishop above by his said Attorney -  
alleged. And this for the Lord the King he demands may be  
inquired by the Country. And the aforsaid now Bishop by his said  
Attorney doth the like. Therefore it is commanded to the Sheriff  
of Rutland that he cause to come before the Justices aforsaid  
here on this said Instant tenth day of September at four of the  
Clock of the same Day twenty four honest and lawfule men of the  
Vicinie of Lydington in his County to do those things which between  
the Lord the King and the aforsaid now Bishop are injomed to them  
etc. At which hour here comes as well the aforsaid Reginald  
who for the Lord the King etc. as the aforsaid now Bishop by his  
Attorney aforsaid And also the Sheriff in the manner commanded  
his aforsaid Precept in all things hath done and Executed  
Upon this Twenty four honest and lawfule men impanelled by  
the aforsaid Sheriff <sup>come</sup> and twelve of those are impanelled elected  
tryed and sworn are as follows William Villers John Durrant  
of Baroughdon and Thomas Durrant John Thornton William  
Overton Thomas Clarke Henry Creton John Dronne John  
Hunt William Hayson Robert Hardaef and William Morecroft  
and the aforsaid Rangers to wit John Lothy William Sheffield  
Thomas Sofeld John Wight John Marston William Petyfer Thomas  
Overton Robert Sykes Hugh Bolster Robert Blackbourn and  
William Farnowe then and there likewise in this Behaef are sworn  
who say upon their Oath that the aforsaid now Bishop and his  
Predecessors Bishops of Lincoln had and were accustomed to have  
from the time whereof memory is not common of Pastures for his  
Cattle in the aforsaid Place called the Brende within the aforesaid  
Forest of Leyfeld for his men and Tenants aforsaid of Lydington  
Caldecote and Stokedrie aforsaid in manner and form as the said  
now Bishop by his said Attorney amongst other things in his said  
Grim hath alledged. Therefore it is considered by the  
aforsaid Justices here that the aforsaid now Bishop may enjoy and  
have quietlly common of Pasture for his Cattle in the aforesaid Place  
called the Brende within the aforesaid Forest of Leyfeld for his said  
Men and Tenants of Lydington Caldecote and Stokedries in manner  
and form as by the aforesaid twelve Jurors and Rangers above appears

And because for certain causes to the Court here shewen the  
aforesaid now Bishop is not now prepared further to shew and  
prove his claim in the rest of the premises expressed in the claim  
aforesaid. Therefore by leave of the Court as before he thereupon  
preys Respite and it is granted to him et. And upon this Day is  
given to him thereupon as above at Westminster until the aforesaid  
Morrow of Saint Martin to further shew and prove thereupon his  
claim aforesaid the Right of the King in the mean time in all things  
being saved &c. We therefore by the Tenor of the writ Indenture  
or Recital of the same and of the Act aforesaid at the Request of  
the Reverend Father in Christ William now Bishop of Lincoln have  
caused to be exemplified by these presents In Testimony whereof  
we have caused these our Letters to be made Patent witness myself  
at Westminster the sixth day of June in the fourth Year of our Reign
