At a Meeting of the Trustees for putting in execution
an Act of Parliament for repairing the Road from Bridgford
Lane in the County of Nottingham to the Bowling Green at
Hethering in the County of Northampton held at the Falcon
Inn in Uppingham on Wednesday the 2^d day of April 1755.

Ordered amongst other things/ That

Wild Surveyor of the Northern

Division of the said Road, Mr Thos Lacy of Hethering aforesaid, and
Mr Samuel Hawley Surveyor of the Road between Leicester and
Peterborough or any two of them Do forthwith set about the answering
the following Queries; And that they or one of them do make their
Report in Writing and that one or more of them do attend our next
Meeting to be held at Uppingham aforesd on Wednesday the 23^d day of
this instant —

Q 1. What will be the Expence of two Drains That under the South End of the
Braad to raise the Road over that hollow for making the ascent
Conmodious for Carriages & a Wall for supporting the new made Bank
there supposing the road is to pass over the ancient tract by & spring?

The Expence of the Two Drains under the South side of the
Braad will be six pounds a Mile being not necessary to support
it It being as well supported by Banks of Earth

And another such in the South side of Liddington Cow pasture & how high
it will be necessary to make the respective Drains?

The Expence of a Drain on the South side of Liddington Cow pasture
being three foot high - - - - - 5 n o o

Q 2. How many foot perpendicular it will be necessary to take off the tops
of the several hills of the Braad Liddington Cow pasture, and Stoke park
from the highest parts of the hills?

It will be necessary to take off the tops of the several hills of the
Braad, Liddington, Cow pasture, Stoke park as follows —

Braad hill 3 foot, Liddington Cow pasture four foot, Stoke
Park Six foot morning the Brinkes of the Hills.

Q 3. How much will be the Expence of removing of Earth, Cale or Stone from
tops to the bottoms of the several hills, especially if it shall be found to
consist of Stone, what in that case will be the difference of the Expence?

The Expence of removing the Earth, Cale, or Stone
from the tops of the several hills whether they be
Stone or Earth the difference will not be much } 50 n o o
as Stone will be serviceable to the road - - -

Q 4. What beside this levelling will be the Expence of making the Road a good
Turnpike Road, mentioning in particular what Expences will attend the
several and respective parts?

The Expence of the several & respective parts of
the said Road are and will be much the same and with
such Stone as is found upon the Road to lay at the bottom
& covered with Gravel from Helpy Close in Stoke Bedfords
which is very good & is from the North side of the Broad to
the place where Liddington Road comes in being two
Miles & seven Furlongs } 927. 13. 4

Q 5th What will be the Expence of making a good & convenient Road over the
earliest way by Liddington, & what will be the Expence of the roads and
respective parts?

The Expence of making a good & convenient Road over
the earliest way at Liddington being covered with Stones
at the bottom & Gravel out of Liddington Field on the
Top Provided that Gravel would be sufficient in - - - - -
quantity which we are very doubtful of will be - - - - - } 1310. 6. 0
But if Liddington Gravel prove insufficient, it will
cost more - - - - - } 30125. 0. 0

Q 6th How & where are materials to be found near each of the roads?

Materials for the Upper Road as Stone upon Uppingham Broad -
Liddington Pasture, & Liddington Field and Gravel in Helpy
Close all near or adjoining to the Road

Materials for Liddington Road are upon the Broad Stone
adjoining to the Road, Liddington Field Six Furlongs from the Road
Gravel two Furlongs from the Road but not very good.

Q 7th What will be the difference of expences in keeping the two Roads in Repair
supposing each Road to be kept at the publick Expence?

The Materials being so near the Upper Road it will be
maintained at the least Expence -

The length of the upper Road from the dividing of the Roads is Two
Miles & Seven Furlongs

The length of the Liddington Road to & from the said places is two
Miles seven Furlong & 32 Pole

Ordered - That they be empowered to employ persons to search for materials
& whatever else is necessary in their Survey & Estimate

Ordered - That they bring in a just measurement of the length of both Roads

Ordered - That they give their opinion on the several Roads above mentioned
& report any other thing they shall think necessary & useful in the
affair which Road will in their opinion be most proper to make use
of as the Turnpike Road and their Reasons for it

Ordered That John Petty of Liddington Malster and Samuel Dooley of
Rockingham do attend to show the Surveyors the road
