By the Custom of the Manor the Youngest Son or Youngest Brother
is heir, but in Case of Daughters each are admitted to an undivided
Share as at Common Law.

In April 1710: Admission granted to ^{Mr} King of the Moiety of a Cottage in Dorset
on the Lord of Honycuton & Martha his wife since which it appears that
in April 1717: the S^r Martha Surrendered the same to Honycuton &
forself & the Heirs of their Bodies so that without a Recovery King had no
good Title after they are dead.

April 1725: John Waterfoild found Heir of Anthony Waterfoild to One Cottage
in Dodington but Ann Waterfoild ^{with her} had it for life therefore he refuses to be
admitted to the Recovery of it.
