the name of Grant's ledger and Court Record of the right hon<sup>ble</sup> John Earl of Arundel Baron of Burroughs thow holden the right hon<sup>ble</sup> day of April in the year of our lord's first coming to the crown not yet in England one thereof six hundred shillings and three pence  
By the Shewers there it is sheweth as followeth  
Jurors & Homage  
of Liddington  
First that John Wright and James Strotton have broken the parson's And that Robert Johnson went Robert Mantons Robert Johnson  
John Mantons and Anthony Winton have trospass'd w<sup>th</sup> there sheeps in the whole field in the night tyme And that Hugh Shannon hath  
ingress'd w<sup>th</sup> mares and stables in the whole field contrary to the order of this Court And that John Wynne and Anthony Dunsley have  
ingress'd to the day w<sup>th</sup> when it came to their Curres And that Margery Jullson widdow did enterloyned in her house upon the lord's  
day w<sup>th</sup> company to the annoyance of her neighbours And that Henry Dyer w<sup>th</sup> Robert and Richard Ward for carrying goods in  
the field of Liddington for w<sup>th</sup> they had no common there And that John Strotton hath not repayed w<sup>th</sup> Chymney to the annoyance of his  
neighbourhood And that James Coplebie William Mubund gent<sup>l</sup> Robert Mantons Robert Stille and widdow Waterbold have taken in  
several farmes contrary to the statute And that Mathew Lawell and David Dreyer have cutt up grassed away w<sup>th</sup> a great quantity  
to the annoyance of this Court And that Henry Mubund hath wasted a great part of the Common at a place called it w<sup>th</sup> by digging stone there w<sup>th</sup> therefore  
they are amerced to have for their default the several fines set upon their heads

And at this Court Thomas Smyth James Dixtall James Winton and James Hill being defendants did present and say that upon the 26<sup>th</sup> day of  
February 1652 widdow sheeps were taken at strayed w<sup>th</sup> the jurisdiction of this Court and were impounded appriz'd & paym<sup>nt</sup> according to  
the statute in that behalfs And that upon the 17<sup>th</sup> day of October 1652 one widdow was found as an strayer as aforesaid and impounded  
and paym<sup>nt</sup> according to the statute and w<sup>th</sup> after delivered into the custody of the Lord Bayliffe

And at this Court it was found by the homage that Thomas Dorett who held to him and his heirs by copy of Court Rolle according to the custom  
of this manor and cottage and three acres of land w<sup>th</sup> there appurtenances in Liddington aforesaid since the last Court dyed thereof got seized and  
that Sarah Elizabeth and Alice Dorett are the daughters and heirs of the said Thomas Dorett to the said cottage land & appurtenances

And that Euerard Stanger who held to him and his heirs by copy of Court Rolle according to the custom of this manor and cottage and one acre  
and a halfe land & other appurtenances thereunto belonging in Liddington aforesaid since the last Court dyed thereof got seized and that  
John Dorett is and next heirs unto the said Euerard Stanger who being absent at this Court desired to be admitted Tenant  
to the said appurtenances to whom the lord by his steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and to hold the said appurtenances unto the  
said John Dorett his heirs and assigns for ever according to the custom of the manor aforesaid rendering to the lord yearly the rent  
of six pence and other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the lord a fine for their admittance to hold the same or h<sup>al</sup>ts made  
healthe and is admitted Tenant And after all this Court the said John Dorett did surrender into the hands of the lord by the  
hands of his steward the said messuage cottage and appurtenances to the use and behoofe of the said John Dorett  
during the term of her natural life and from and after her decease to the use and behoofe of John Dorett daughter of the said John Dorett  
and of her heirs and assigns for ever to whom the lord by his steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and to hold the same  
unto the said John Dorett and John Dorett in maner & forme aforesaid at the will of the lord according to the custom of the manor aforesaid  
rendering to the lord yearly the rent of six pence and other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the lord a fine for their  
admittance to hold the same or h<sup>al</sup>ts made healthe and is admitted Tenant

And at this Court Richard Smith gent<sup>l</sup> did surrender into the hands of the lord by the hands of his steward and cottage of messuage  
in Liddington aforesaid known by the name of the Draine to the use and behoofe of his best daughter and of her heirs and assigns for ever  
to whom the lord by his steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and to hold the said cottage & appurtenances unto the said Richard Smith  
and his heirs and assigns for ever at the will of the lord according to the custom of the manor aforesaid  
rendering to the lord yearly twenty pence rent of six pence and other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the lord a  
fine for his admittance to hold the same or h<sup>al</sup>ts made healthe and is admitted Tenant

And that Mathew Elton hath surrendered into the hands of the lord by the hands of Thomas Smyth one of the Justices of this manor  
and half an acre land w<sup>th</sup> the appurtenances in Liddington aforesaid called Chivittes now or late in the tenure or occupation of the said Mathew Elton  
or of his assigns to the use and behoofe of the said Mathew Elton and of his heirs and assigns for ever to whom the lord by his steward hath  
thereof granted seizin to have and to hold the said half an acre land and appurtenances unto the said Mathew Elton his heirs and  
assigns for ever at the will of the lord according to the custom of the manor aforesaid rendering to the lord yearly six pence and  
other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the lord a fine for his admittance to hold the same h<sup>al</sup>ts made healthe and is admitted  
Tenant

And that Alice Widdow hath surrendered into the hands of the lord by the hands of James Winton one of the Justices of this manor  
aforesaid one messuage and one yard land w<sup>th</sup> the appurtenances situate lying and being in charge by water in Liddington aforesaid to the use  
and behoofe of the said Alice Widdow for and during the term of her natural life and from and after her decease to the use &  
behoofe of John Widdow some of her heirs and assigns for ever to whom the lord by his steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and to hold  
the said messuage yard land and appurtenances unto the said Alice  
for and during the term of her natural life and from and after her decease to the use & behoofe of the said John Widdow & of his heirs &  
assigns for ever at the will of the lord according to the custom of the manor aforesaid rendering to the lord yearly six pence and  
other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the lord a fine for their admittance to hold the same h<sup>al</sup>ts made healthe and  
is admitted Tenant

First that John Brown the elder Danell Hill widdow Henry Thomas Elton Henry Newbond John Winton have charged the common  
w<sup>th</sup> cows after Martinmas And that Henry Newbond William Newbond Richard Morris John Thomas Elton Henry Newbond John Winton  
after Martinmas contrary to the order of this Court And that Henry Newbond & John Thomas Elton & Robert Mantons did  
often trospass w<sup>th</sup> there sheeps in the several fields of Caldecott And that Henry Newbond hath brought in a cow into the Court before her and  
the Court w<sup>th</sup> contrary to the order of this Court And that the said Henry Newbond hath made a fence w<sup>th</sup> a hedge and a ditch all  
w<sup>th</sup> mill loynes And that Thomas George hath broken the assize in selling of cloth And that Thomas George hath broken the assize in selling of  
bread w<sup>th</sup> the jurisdiction of this Court And that John Dunsley widdow Charles Jullson & widdow Dunsley have charged the common w<sup>th</sup> sheep  
w<sup>th</sup> son and Anthony Dunsley have charged in the field w<sup>th</sup> sheeps therefore they are amerced and have forfeit to the lord the several fines  
set upon their heads

And at this Court it was found by the homage that Peter Woodroffe the elder John Woodroffe the younger and Elizabeth his wife the said Elizabeth being  
w<sup>th</sup> examined by the steward and John Woodroffe the younger have surrendered into the hands of the lord by the hands of his steward and doct<sup>r</sup> in  
Dunsley w<sup>th</sup> field of land meadow and pasture & other appurtenances thereunto belonging being amonged one half an acre and one acre of land  
being in charge of the said Peter Woodroffe the elder and John Woodroffe the younger against the hall yettill loynes lying in the last being part of the said John  
Woodroffe the elder one acre of meadow called Kings holme late in the occupation of the said Peter Woodroffe the elder & a piece of ground called  
half an acre land & a piece of land late in the occupation of the said John Woodroffe the younger and one acre in the occupation of Peter Woodroffe the younger  
to the use & behoofe of the said Peter Woodroffe the younger & of his heirs & assigns for ever to whom the lord by his steward hath thereof granted seizin to  
have and to hold the said doct<sup>r</sup> h<sup>al</sup>ts made healthe and is admitted Tenant rendering to the lord yearly six pence and other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the lord a fine for

And at the Court Robert Burghill and others the wife the said dispute being jointly examined by the Justices and the Sheriff of the County of Middlesex into the hands of the Lord by the hands of his Steward Two lands of arable land lying in the Parishes of Cudderswell and Cudderswell the hay and meadows and all other lands and tenements in the Parishes of Cudderswell and Cudderswell the use and behoof of Henry Woodcock his wife and all his heirs and assigns for ever the Lord by his Steward hath thereof granted Henry Woodcock to hold the said lands into the said Cudderswell the said heirs and assigns for ever at the will of the Lord according to the Customs of the Manor of Cudderswell the Lord yearly 3<sup>d</sup> Kent Suits of Court all other Services thereof due accustomed they gave the Lord a Fine for his admittance to hold the same as hath made Assize or is admitted Tenant

And that Henry Woodcock hath surrendered into the hands of the Lord by the hands of Walter Woodcock the Sheriff of the County of Middlesex the Manor of Cudderswell and one half yard land and three other parcels of land the use and behoof of the said Henry Woodcock and his heirs and assigns for ever the Lord by his Steward hath thereof granted Henry Woodcock to hold the said lands into the said Cudderswell the said heirs and assigns for ever at the will of the Lord according to the Customs of the Manor of Cudderswell the Lord yearly 3<sup>d</sup> Kent Suits of Court all other Services thereof due accustomed they gave the Lord a Fine for his admittance to hold the same as hath made Assize or is admitted Tenant

And that the said Henry Woodcock hath surrendered into the hands of the Lord by the hands of Walter Woodcock the Sheriff of the County of Middlesex the Manor of Cudderswell and one half yard land and three other parcels of land the use and behoof of the said Henry Woodcock and his heirs and assigns for ever the Lord by his Steward hath thereof granted Henry Woodcock to hold the said lands into the said Cudderswell the said heirs and assigns for ever at the will of the Lord according to the Customs of the Manor of Cudderswell the Lord yearly 3<sup>d</sup> Kent Suits of Court all other Services thereof due accustomed they gave the Lord a Fine for his admittance to hold the same as hath made Assize or is admitted Tenant

And at the Court it was shewed by the homage that William Potton in default about seven years and about ten years were seized of a Cottage in the Parishes of Cudderswell and Cudderswell the use and behoof of the said Henry Woodcock and his heirs and assigns for ever the Lord by his Steward hath thereof granted Henry Woodcock to hold the said Cottage into the said Cudderswell the said heirs and assigns for ever at the will of the Lord according to the Customs of the Manor of Cudderswell the Lord yearly 3<sup>d</sup> Kent Suits of Court all other Services thereof due accustomed they gave the Lord a Fine for his admittance to hold the same as hath made Assize or is admitted Tenant
