

Liddington in the County of Northampton
In the Court of the Lord and Count Baron of the right honorable John Duke of Exeter Baron of Burleigh there holden the thirtieth and thirtieth day of April
in the year of our Lord God 1657 by the Steward there in view sworn as followeth vizt

The Jurors Thomas Edmond Gismoy Clement Plittie Robert Manton Moses Allen James Gid Thomas Smyth William Henry Simon Ward Stephen Manton
Thomas Manton Robert Fole John Groland George Sewall James Appleby and Robert Rowler being all of them being

First that widow Waterford hath not kept in repair the fence between her and William Gorn and that Gabriel Collyn hath made a highway
over Robert Groland's grass and that William Gorn hath trespassed wth upon houses in the parish of Liddington and that John Johnson
hath also trespassed wth one horse And that Anthony Marbin hath smothered the wth corn wth Tom Schoops And that Rowland Waterford
hath smothered the wth wth wth Schoops And that Thomas Boyer John Webb St^r Osmont Schoonwood and Thomas Lamb^t a John
Pitt have smothered the wth wth Schoops And that William Rubens gent^l at this court refused although thereunto required
by the Steward to come of the jury contrary to his oath of fealty therefore they are fined and amerced to pay the several fines and
amerciam^{ts} set upon their heads by the Steward and Edmond Gismoy Clement Plittie who were sworn as above

And at this court it was presented by the demanders that Rowland Gid since the last court seized of one cottage holden of the Lord by copy
of court rolls according to the custom of this Manor And that Ann and Lidia Gid are his daughters and heirs to the same after the death
of ^{the said} Gid their mother who hath an estate in the same for the term of her life

And at this court it was found by the homage that Richard Winter clerk seized of the tenement of a messuage and one yard land in Liddington
appertaining to the deceased of Anthony Winter late Author of the said Richard now also deceased holden of the Lord of this Manor by copy of
court rolls at the will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor And that Eliza Winter an infant (that is to say) of the age
of fifteen years or thereabouts is the only daughter and heir of the said Richard Winter in her own person at this court came and pleaded and admitted into the
said messuage yard land and premises to whom the Lord by his Steward thereof granted seizin to have and hold the said
messuage yard land and premises wth the appurtenances unto the said Eliza Winter her heirs and assigns for ever all the will of the Lord according
to the custom of the said Manor tendering to the Lord therefore yearly rent sum of Court and all other services therefore due and accustomed
Henry Turner her father in law and James Winter her uncle are elected and admitted her guardians

And at this court Elizabeth Blawd surrendered into the hands of the Lord by the hands of Steward one cottage wth the appurtenances in Liddington
to the use and behoof of Eliza Blawd mother of the said Elizabeth for and during the term of her natural life and after her death to the
use of the said Elizabeth her heirs and assigns for ever to whom the Lord by his Steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and hold
the said cottage wth the appurtenances to the use and behoof of the said Elizabeth all the will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor
tendering to the Lord yearly rent sum of Court and all other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the Lord assent for their admittance
to hold the same or have made fealty and are admitted tenants

And that the 29th day of October 1653 James Winter and Mary his wife the said Mary being solely examined by the Steward surrendered into
the hands of the Lord by the hands of his Steward one messuage wth the appurtenances in Liddington aforesaid and two acres of arable land wth the
appurtenances in Liddington aforesaid late George Brownes and then or late in the occupation of the said James or of his assignee to the use and behoof
of Jonathan Colled Edward Thorne and Jeremiah Colled clerk and of their heirs and assigns for ever

And that the said 29th day of October 1653 Richard Ward and Elizabeth his wife (the said Elizabeth being solely examined by the Steward
did surrender into the hands of the Lord by the hands of his Steward one messuage wth the appurtenances in Liddington aforesaid then or late in
the occupation of the said Richard Ward and John Warren or their assignee to the use and behoof of Jonathan Colled Edward Thorne and
Jeremiah Colled and of their heirs and assigns for ever

And at this court came Hugh Bomer and surrendered into the hands of the Lord by the hands of his Steward one messuage and close and one yard
land wth three acres of these appurtenances in Liddington containing by estimation one messuage one doff or close eighteene acres of land three
acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture to the use and behoof of Edmond Gismoy and of his heirs and assigns for ever to whom the Lord by
his Steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and hold the premises aforesaid unto the said Edmond Gismoy his heirs and assigns for
ever all the will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor tendering to the Lord yearly rent sum of Court and all other services
therefore due and accustomed they gave the Lord assent for their admittance to hold the same hath made fealty and is admitted tenant

And afterwards to wit at the same court cometh Robert Groland and demandeth against the aforesaid Edmond Gismoy in Liddington
concerning the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in Liddington
aforesaid holden of the Manor aforesaid by copy of court rolls of the same Manor And maketh the report of state to the said Edmond Gismoy in form
and nature of writ of entry upon distress in the post And upon this the said Robert Groland in his proper person do maindeth against the said
Edmond Gismoy the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in his demesne ad
this court as his right and inheritance And in to wth the said Edmond Gismoy hath no entry unless by despoison wth Hugh Bomer that he was
seized of the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in his demesne ad
of the and of right all the will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor tendering to the Lord yearly rent sum of Court and all other services
therefore due and accustomed they gave the Lord assent for their admittance to hold the same hath made fealty and is admitted tenant

And the aforesaid Edmond in his proper person cometh and defendeth his right when or calleth the doff to warrant Hugh Bomer
who is sent here in court in his proper person and trouble doth warrant to him the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow
and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances or elud upon this the aforesaid Robert Groland demandeth against Hugh Bomer tenant in his demesne ad
the messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in his demesne ad of the and of right all the
said messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in his demesne ad of the and of right all the

tenant in his demesne ad the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in his demesne ad of the
says he was seized of the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances in his demesne ad of the
and of right all the will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor in the time of Charles late King of England taking thereof to the value

at elud the same Robert Groland here in court came again to this court in his own proper person And the aforesaid John Bursnell although solemnly called came not
but in contempt of the Court hath defaulted therefore it is considered that the aforesaid Robert Groland do recover his seizin against the aforesaid
Edmond Gismoy of the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances And that Edmond Gismoy
may have of the lands of the said Hugh Bomer to the value of or elud moreover that the said Hugh Bomer may have of the lands of the said John Bursnell to the
value of or elud the said John Bursnell in mortgage or elud upon this the said Robert Groland requirith a writ of habere faciem^{ts} to him and it is granted
of the court to wit to land stay wth child and did certify this court that he by virtue of the writ aforesaid to him directed the 23rd day of April did cause to have
to the said Robert Groland full seizin of the said messuage doff eighteene acres of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances by
the proper aforesaid to him was commanded And afterwards all this same day the aforesaid Robert Groland Edmond Gismoy and Hugh Bomer came in
their own person and surrendered into the hands of the Lord by the hands of his Steward in the same court the aforesaid messuage doff eighteene acres
of land three acres of meadow and seven acres of pasture wth the appurtenances to the use and behoof of the said Edmond Gismoy and of his heirs and assigns
for ever to whom the Lord by his Steward hath thereof granted seizin to have and hold the said premises wth the appurtenances unto the said
Edmond Gismoy his heirs and assigns for ever all the will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor tendering to the Lord yearly
rent sum of Court and all other services therefore due and accustomed they gave the Lord assent for their admittance to hold the same
or hath made fealty and is admitted tenant
