executors administrators or assigns or any of them do make and truly pay or cause to be  
payed unto the aboves named Edward Marrett Robert Mylles and Edmund Syme gentl.  
or to their certain attorney executors administrators or assigns  
the full and just sum of Two hundred and seauen pounds and eighteen shillings  
and six pence of good and lawfull money of England at or upon the eleventh  
day of February next ensuing the day of the date of the Surrender abovesaid  
at or within the now dwelling house of the abovesaid James Dixlatt frithwaite  
in Liddington aforesaid in the County of Rutland yoman without land or  
duty that then the abovesaid Surrender is to be void or else to stand  
in force and vertue.
