Be it remembered that by day & years above written
Robert Boyer & Elizabeth his wife two of the most honorable
Barons of the Exchequer & the said Elizabeth
being solely & entirely seized by Henry Ferris Esq.
Steward of the said Exchequer did give & convey
into the hands of the Lord of the said Exchequer by the
hands of the said Steward all that messuage or
tenement yard barn stable out house & other
edifices & place of pasture thereunto belonging
with their & day of their appurtenances in the possession of
the said Robert Boyer So have & be the wife of
Alice Ferris of Liddington aforesaid Spinster
(Grandchild of William Ward of Liddington aforesaid
Esquire) of the said Exchequer assigned for ever
according to the custom of the said Exchequer Upon
this provided condition notwithstanding that if the
said Robert Boyer or Elizabeth his wife their
heirs or assigns or any of them do or shall need
& truly pay or cause to be paid unto the said Alice
Ferris her executors administrators or assigns the
full & entire sum of twelve pounds of gold and
lawfull money of England with the lawfull
interest & interest thereof of the money on the
third twentieth day of September next ensuing
the date hereof then this warrant to be void &
of no effect

Memorandum of the year first above written Elizabeth
Behor Wood doe surrender into the hands of the
Lord of y^e Mannor by y^e hands of Henry Hane
Esq^r Steward of y^e said Mannor. All that Messuages
our tenement yard Barne stabled out houses & other
edified & a close of pasture therunto belonging
with their appurtenances to the use & behoofe of
Miss Sarratt of Sidmington aforesaid Spinster
Grandchild of William Ward of her heirs &
assigned forever according to the Customs of the
said Mannor provided upon this condition
nevertheless that if the said Elizabeth Behor her
heirs or assigned or any of them doe shall wolle
truly pay or cause to be paid unto the said Miss
Sarratt her Executors Administrators or assigned
the full & just sume of three score pounds of
lawfull money of England wth the Interest & increase
thereof of like lawfull money on the seventeenth
day of October which shall be in y^e year of our
Lord (1685) then this Surrender to be void or
else to be in full force & vertue
